1. Why are you running? If elected, what would be your top goals as school board member?

- · I would like to continue with my lifetime mission of nurturing and strengthening children and teens. I have called Osceola County home for more than two decades, and I currently work on behalf of the community in several roles, including Public Educator for the Osceola County Fire Rescue and EMS, Founder/Director of the domestic violence awareness non-profit Life in Your Hands, and Past-Chair of the Osceola Chamber Hispanic Business Council. I have a master's degree in Education Counseling and an undergraduate degree in Social Work, Psychology, and Education from the Ana G. Mendez University. My husband and I live in BVL and together have five children, and six grandchildren. Currently, my youngest daughter is in the 9th grade and one of my grandchildren is in the 3rd grade, both in Osceola County.

2. In what school district or community activities/organizations have you been involved?

- School Social Worker for Department of Education, Caguas, Puerto Rico school social worker at an elementary school providing individual and group counseling and therapy, creating prevention programs, helping students cope with crisis situations, educating parents about community services, providing referrals for services and creating programs to improve attendance.
- Homebound/ESE Teacher (Osceola County)- prepare lesson plans and instructional materials/implementing them based on individual needs.
- ESE Teacher Assistant and One-on-One (Osceola High School) assist teacher with daily activities, help students with academic and essential life skills.
- ESE Teacher Assistant (Horizon Middle School) assist teacher with daily activities, help students with academic and life skills, meal prep, personal hygiene (change diapers, take wheelchair students to bathroom) and other tasks.
- ESE Teacher English and Learning Strategies (Poinciana High School) Developing IEP's; Create individualized Education Programs/Plan for each student, setting learning goals and accommodations, work with parents, teacher counselors, vocational rehabilitation to discuss student progress and future. prepare lesson plans and instructional material.
- Public Education Coordinator (Osceola County Fire Department All Osceola County School) -Developing training for all schools, creating curriculums, lesson plans for different educational levels, setting goals, and fire prevention activities.

3. What is the top issue you believe the district needs to address?

• School Safety. Nothing is more important than the safety of our children. As a former classroom teacher, I know that teachers can't teach and students can't learn if they are not safe at school. I will make student safety the School Board's top priority. I will ensure we have a sworn law enforcement officer in all our schools protecting our students and staff. I will work with the Sheriff and the Kissimmee Police Department to guarantee our school resource officers have the best equipment and training. I will require all our campuses and facilities to have up-to-date safety technology and policies.

4. What can be done to ensure everyone who graduates is either ready for college or a vocation?

• As a learning strategies teacher for Special Education students that I was, I would promote programs with learning strategies such as notes, organization, Cornell method, underlining, individual and group work among others. Always considering external elements such as psychological and social factors and exploring alternatives for mental health programs to reduce anxiety when taking exams. As a former school social worker in Puerto Rico, I understand how crucial it is to partner with agencies that offer multidisciplinary services to students. Also create incentives at the district's level that motivate students to study and focus more while we work on integrating parents using social and traditional media. My beginnings were as a special education teacher; hard work but one that fills the heart. I also experienced a lack of resources and limitations in the program. In my plans are coordinating focus groups and meetings with parents and teachers to explore alternatives and suggestions that can help our ESE students. Promotion of education and preparation for adult life. It is of utmost importance that our students are ready for the work place. Things as simple as writing a check, opening a bank account, learning how to sign, job searching, and more, I taught my students in the Learning Strategies class. It was very satisfying and productive for them. I would be a great ally of the AVID teachers and to continue implementing their strategies that enrich any subject because I believe in the program 100%, without forgetting to expand our technical and certification programs. There is a lot to do, but first I must get there.

5. How should the district address underperforming schools?

• Develop an action plan, forming a strong leadership team and improve instruction.

 To offer more competitive compensation for classroom teachers. To provide support for new teachers such as mentor programs, student pathway in high schools to provide financial support for students seeking a career in education; The use of technology to recruit.

• I recognize that we need to provide choices for parents and students according to their needs. However, I believe that in order for students to integrate to the public system there needs to be equitable measures in place in the public schools for the benefit of the student. This will provide more accurate measurement of the student's educational levels. There needs to be accountability and assurance that students are progressing; The same accountability that the public schools have.

1. Why are you running? If elected, what would be your top goals as school board member?

2. In what school district or community activities/organizations have you been involved?

• I've been involved with Reaching hearts food pantry at Casa Familiar de Restauracion, a volunteer with project beautiful helping provide care boxes for Domestic Violence Victims and hygiene packets for the homeless, an advocate for ITSAN a nonprofit for those struggling with Topical Steroid Withdrawal Syndrome, a supporter of Team Awesomism and Twic3 as Good both are nonprofits for Adults with autism, Fundacion Emprendedores de Luz, and the F.A. Multicultural Inc. de Florida a ministry to help children have a better future.

3. What is the top issue you believe the district needs to address?

• There are a few that I feel need attention but my focus would be on student achievement and teacher recruitment and retention.

4. What can be done to ensure everyone who graduates is either ready for college or a vocation?

• To ensure students are I would suggest academic preparation, skill development, and emotional readiness. For instance, writing and communication, challenging courses, critical thinking and problem solving, clubs and sports, independence and responsibility.

 No, while many schools are considered safe continuous evaluation and improvement of safety measures are essential to address emerging threats and ensure a secure learning environment.
